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Fun that Spans the Ages

Those passing by St. John's Herr Estate early this past August may have noticed something unusual: a sky filled with mini rockets and a lawn full of excited children and seniors laughing together.

The rocket launch was the conclusion of a new – and very popular – Intergenerational Program at St. John's Herr Estate that started in June. A joint effort between St. John's, the Luthercare for Kids Columbia Early Learning Center, Park Elementary School and St. John's Lutheran Church in Columbia, the Intergenerational Program encourages learning and sharing between elementary children and seniors.

St. John's Herr Estate and Luthercare For Kids Chaplain Dione Klepetka is the driving force behind the program.

In a previous calling, Chaplain Dione worked with preschoolers. When she started working with seniors, she knew bringing those two worlds together would be beneficial for everyone.

"The kids were so enthusiastic," says Chaplain Dione. "Whether it was picking asparagus and blueberries, making yarn dolls, hula dancing at a luau, participating in a scavenger hunt or building cities out of Legos, the children looked forward to new adventures each week. They also looked forward to spending time with their 'older' new friends."

St. John's Herr Estate Executive Director Anita Martin says the community has always believed in bridging the generations and has been active in supporting Columbia's local schools. "We have children and young people come into St. John's as frequently as possible," she says. "At prom time, the kids come in to model their clothes, we make up power packs for local children

in need and our Residents' Council works with schools to find out how we may support them. This program, however, is the first to really foster cooperation and promote meaningful interactions among different generations. It's been wonderful."

Chaplain Dione agrees. "The kids were so great. Everyone truly benefited from the program. The children saw healthy, vibrant examples of people in their retirement years; residents got to see the best side of the young generation."

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Children who took part in the Intergenerational Program are students at Park Elementary School who participate in Luthercare for Kids Columbia Early Learning Center's summer program. Center Director Deb Meley says that between six and nine children from fourth and fifth grades were "regulars" in the program. She adds that the kids' families were very supportive and encouraging.

Anita says the programs are designed to promote a back-and-forth rapport between the kids and residents. "Residents share what they know, kids share what they know," she says.

The kids were surveyed to see what interested them. Specific programs were designed around those interests. Deb added that, in addition to learning new skills and enjoying new experiences, the program offered the children an opportunity to grow socially. "The interaction with the seniors taught them respect and appreciation for a generation of people whom, in some cases, the children had no close personal contact."

Chaplain Dione and Anita say the success of the program can be

attributed to great teamwork. Matt Landis, St. John's Community Life Enrichment Manager, was instrumental in program development. He also transported the children in the St. John's bus. If the bus wasn't available, Rick Warner, a volunteer from St. John's Lutheran Church in Columbia, provided the ride. Jason Garner, St. John's Dining Manager, and his staff always made sure the children had plenty of fresh, healthy snacks.

"But it was our residents who really made sure the program took off," says Anita. "Our residents truly enjoy children. They love to inspire and teach and the children loved to show and learn. Now these kids don't look at our residents as old people. They look at them as new friends with a lot to offer."

In her position, Chaplain Dione is responsible for spiritual development and growth. She said this program is at the very core of what she does: showing people how to treat each other with love and respect.

At the request of the residents, children and their families, another Intergenerational Program will likely take place over the Christmas break. As for next summer . . . stay tuned!

Meet Rosie, Luther Acres' Newest Resident

One of Luther Acres' newest residents has boundless energy, lots of love to share and has quickly become one of the most popular gals on campus.

She is Rosie, a six-month-old Miniature Golden-Doodle – a mixed breed of Golden Retriever and a Miniature Poodle – who arrived in mid-May as an eight-week-old. The breed is known for its affectionate and gentle nature, along with its intelligence and social skills.

Luther Acres Therapeutic Recreation Manager Mary Schreiber is fostering Rosie at her home until the pup has completed obedience training and is more mature, but the long-term plan is for Rosie to live full-time at the Luther Acres Healthcare Center. "She is a friendly, outgoing little pup, and she seems to know which residents keep treats in their room," Mary says with a chuckle.

One of those residents is Thelma Buchter, who keeps a box of dog biscuits on a shelf near her door. "We all love her, and I think she's getting to love us, too," says Thelma, who particularly enjoys when Rosie sits on her lap or begs for belly rubs.

Some will remember Buddy, Luther Acres' therapy dog who came to the community in 2012 and sadly passed away over a year ago. Since then, residents had been asking for another dog, Mary says, so she brought the issue before the Luther Acres Residents' Council. Their response was resoundingly positive.

“We do have therapy dogs visit, but it wasn’t the same as having a dog,” Mary says. “Some residents always had dogs. Some gave up their dogs when they moved here. To have a dog of their own became very important.”

There are many health benefits to interacting with pets, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Pets can decrease blood pressure, cholesterol levels, triglyceride levels and feelings of loneliness, and they can increase opportunities for socialization, outdoor activities and exercise.

It’s clear that Rosie is bringing joy to Luther Acres residents. One resident said she loves when Rosie kisses her; another enjoys it when Rosie scampers over to her wheelchair and stands up, placing her paws on the chair and begs for a little affection. Residents from across the campus visit Rosie on a regular basis, and they have also been very supportive of various fundraisers for her.

Robert Brandt, Jr., Chairman and Founder of Benchmark Construction (the event's Anniversary Sponsor) and Chair of Luthercare's Board of Directors, welcomed a field of generous individuals, corporate sponsors, Luthercare residents and staff all vying for first place.
